Out of the Darkness

Donkeys around the land will be on call tomorrow as the Christian Church marks Palm Sunday, Jesus's arrival in Jerusalem, and begins the observance of Holy Week – the dramatic series of events leading to his death on the cross.

The gospel accounts plumb the depths of human emotions and behaviour – betrayal, cowardice, jealousy – but also tell of hope and kindness – the woman who anointed Jesus's feet and the faithful followers at the foot of the cross.

The pieces we have chosen depict and reflect upon these events and will be interspersed with brief verses from St Matthew's gospel, signposting a meditative journey through Holy Week.

PSALMI PENITENTIALES

A Lenten sequence based on the Penitential Psalms and Ubi caritas

1. Antiphon: Ubi caritas (i)

Where charity and love are, God is there. Christ's love has gathered us into one. Let us rejoice and be pleased in him. Let us fear, and let us love the living God. And may we love each other with a sincere heart. Amen.

2. Domine, ne in furore tuo arguas me Psalm 6:1-9

O Lord, rebuke me not in thine anger, neither chasten me in thy hot displeasure. Have mercy upon me. O Lord: for I am weak: O Lord, heal me; for my bones are vexed. My soul is also sore vexed: but thou, O Lord, how long? Return, O Lord, deliver my soul: oh save me for thy mercies' sake. For in death there is no remembrance of thee: in the grave who shall give thee thanks? I am weary with my aroaning; all the night make I my bed to swim; I water my couch with my tears. Mine eye is consumed because of grief; it waxeth old because of all mine enemies. Depart from me, all ye workers of iniquity; for the Lord hath heard the voice of my weeping. The Lord hath heard my supplication; the Lord will receive my prayer.

- 3. Antiphon: Ubi caritas (ii)
- Where charity and love are, God is there. As we are gathered into one body, beware, lest we be divided in mind. Let evil impulses stop, let controversy cease, and may Christ our God be in our midst. Amen.
- 4. De profundis Psalm 129 (130)
 Out of the depths have I cried
 unto thee. Lord, hear my voice:
 let thine ears be attentive to the

voice of my supplications. If thou, Lord, shouldst mark iniquities, O Lord, who shall stand? But there is forgiveness with thee, that thou mayest be feared, O Lord. I wait for the Lord, my soul doth wait, and in his word do I hope. My soul waiteth for the Lord more than they that watch for the morning. Let Israel hope in the Lord: for with the Lord there is mercy, and with him is plenteous redemption. And he shall redeem Israel from all his iniquities.

- 5. Antiphon: Ubi caritas (iii) Where charity and love are, God is there. And may we with the saints also, see thy face in glory, O Christ our God: the joy that is immense and good, unto the ages through infinite ages.
- 6. Domine, exaudi orationem meam Psalm 101 (102):1-2, 11-12

Amen.

Hear my prayer, O Lord, and let my cry come unto thee. Hide not thy face from me in the day when I am in trouble; incline thine ear unto me: in the day when I call answer me speedily. My days are like a shadow that declineth; and I am withered like grass. But thou, O Lord, shall endure for ever, and thy remembrance unto all generations.
